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## COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT FOR SUSTAINABILITY

### Introduction

Quality of living in rural and urban environment comes with its share of civic issues and chaotic urban realm, leaving its inhabitants to undesirable living conditions. Fundamental belief is that citizens should be granted the basic right to participate in the processes shaping the environment. In the long run this helps in creating an ecosystem of stewardship, ownership, equity towards surrounding environment thus creating sustainable urbanism. Sustainable urbanism when practiced leads to environmental, social, and economic sustainability of the built environment and aims to create liveable and resilient communities. Engaging citizens is a critical component of sustainable development, as it helps to ensure that the needs and perspectives of community members are taken into account in the planning and implementation of sustainable development projects. Community participation is an effective tool to engage citizens in any level of development.

The National Education Policy (NEP-2020) framework envisages fostering social responsibility and community engagement and presented a transformative framework for higher education in the country, as exemplified through the below lines:

*“The purpose of the education system is to develop a good human being capable of rational thought and action, possessing compassion and empathy, courage and resilience, scientific temper and creative imagination, with sound ethical moorings and values. It aims at producing engaged, productive, and contributing citizens for building an equitable, inclusive, and plural society as envisaged by our Constitution”.*

In line with NEP-2020, Amity University Haryana (AUH) has implemented its new curriculum and credit framework (NCFUG). In NCFUG community engagement is inculcated as one of the important component in the curriculum. A course of 3 credit units on the community engagement services is added as mandatory in the third semester for UG programmes.

### Course Description

This course is designed to equip the students with the knowledge, skills, motivation, and strategies to become proactive agents of positive change in addressing key global challenges and effectively engage with diverse communities. Community engagement is a vital aspect of various sectors, including government, non-government organizations, businesses, and healthcare, among others. Throughout this course, the students will have the opportunity to step out of the traditional classroom setting and engage directly with local communities to understand their challenges and work collaboratively towards sustainable solutions. This hands-on approach will not only enhance their practical skills but also foster a deep understanding of the complexities surrounding sustainability in a real-world context.

Through a combination of theoretical frameworks, practical case studies, experiential learning activities, and engagement with relevant organizations, students can explore and



understand various dimensions of social impact and sustainability. The course will emphasize actionable strategies for addressing poverty, hunger, health disparities, education inequality, gender discrimination, environmental degradation, and other pressing issues.

## Forms of Community Engagement

Community engagement in India takes various forms, reflecting the diverse cultural, social, and economic landscape of the country. Student can choose any combination from the following community engagement forms:

1. **Community-Based Organizations (CBOs):** These are grassroots organizations formed by community members to address local issues such as education, healthcare, sanitation, and livelihoods. CBOs often work closely with the community to identify needs and implement solutions.
2. **Self-Help Groups (SHGs):** SHGs are small groups of people, usually women, who come together to save money, access credit, and support each other in income-generating activities. These groups promote financial inclusion and empower members to improve their livelihoods.
3. **Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs):** NGOs play a significant role in community engagement by implementing various development projects, advocacy campaigns, and social welfare programs. They work on a wide range of issues, including education, healthcare, environmental conservation, and human rights.
4. **Volunteerism:** Many individuals and groups engage in volunteer activities to contribute to their communities. This could involve teaching in schools, organizing health camps, cleaning up neighborhoods, or providing disaster relief assistance.
5. **Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR):** Companies in India are mandated to allocate a portion of their profits towards CSR activities. This often involves partnering with local communities to support initiatives related to education, healthcare, skill development, and environmental sustainability.
6. **Government Programs:** Various government schemes and programs aim to engage with communities to address socio-economic challenges. These include initiatives related to rural development, poverty alleviation, women's empowerment, and skill enhancement.
7. **Social Movements:** India has a long history of social movements led by communities to advocate for their rights and interests. Examples include movements for land rights, tribal rights, environmental conservation, and gender equality.
8. **Local Bodies:** The local bodies are constituted for local planning like Gram Panchayats (for rural area) and Urban Local Bodies/Municipalities (for urban area). In these local bodies, some of community services are conducted through Anganwadis, Primary Health Centers etc.



These forms of community engagement often overlap and complement each other, contributing to holistic development of society.

### Course Objectives:

- To develop a comprehensive understanding of global challenges related to poverty, hunger, health, education, gender inequality, environmental degradation, and peace.
- To develop an appreciation of rural & urban culture, lifestyle, and wisdom amongst participants.
- To cultivate critical thinking and problem-solving skills necessary for addressing complex social and environmental issues.
- To gain practical experience in designing and implementing community-based projects and initiatives aligned with specific SDGs.
- To empower students to take proactive actions towards creating positive social impact and promoting sustainability.
- To foster collaboration and networking with organizations working in various sectors related to social impact and sustainability.

### Course Outcomes

By the end of the course, students will be able to:

- Gain knowledge of theoretical frameworks and practical strategies for addressing global challenges.
- Gain an understanding of rural and urban life, Indian culture and ethos and social realities.
- Develop skills in project management, communication, advocacy, and community engagement.
- Design and implement sustainable community projects and initiatives that address local challenges and contribute to SDG targets.
- Demonstrate an understanding of ethical considerations and cultural sensitivities in social impact work.
- Engage with organizations and initiatives relevant to the course topics, contributing to real-world impact.

### Indicative Fields/Areas for Community Engagement

- **Empowering Women through Self-Help Groups (SHG):** Understanding, Engaging, and Enhancing self-help group Dynamics, Techniques for effective communication, conducting interviews and focus group discussions with SHG women members, Studying SHG Functions and Challenges, Planning and Implementing strategies for sustainable skill development of SHG members.
- **Health and Well-being (SDG 3):** Promoting access to healthcare services in underserved communities, raising awareness about preventive healthcare measures



and disease management, addressing health disparities, and promoting mental well-being, supporting community-based health initiatives, such as vaccination drives and health education programs.

- **Education (SDG 4):** Ensuring inclusive and equitable education for all, improving access to quality education for children and adults, especially in marginalized communities, establishing community learning centers and libraries, Providing scholarships, educational materials, and teacher training programs.
- **Gender Equality (SDG 5):** Empowering women and girls through education, economic opportunities, and leadership training, combating gender-based violence and discrimination, Advocating for women's rights and representation in decision-making processes.
- **Clean Water and Sanitation (SDG 6):** Ensuring access to safe and clean drinking water for all community members, promoting proper sanitation and hygiene practices through community awareness campaigns, supporting the construction of water infrastructure and sanitation facilities in underserved areas.
- **Sustainable Agriculture and Food Security (SDG 2):** Promoting sustainable farming practices, including organic farming and agroecology, enhancing access to agricultural resources, such as seeds, tools, and training programs, Establishing community gardens, food cooperatives, and farmers' markets.
- **Renewable Energy and Climate Action (SDG 7 and SDG 13):** Implementing renewable energy projects, such as solar panels and biogas digesters, in communities, raising awareness about climate change impacts and adaptation strategies, Encouraging sustainable transportation options, energy efficiency measures, and waste management practices.
- **Economic Empowerment and Sustainable Livelihoods (SDG 8):** Supporting small-scale entrepreneurs and cooperatives through access to microfinance and business training, promoting vocational training programs and skills development initiatives, Facilitating market linkages and value chain development for locally produced goods and services.
- **Social Inclusion and Community Development (SDG 10 and SDG 11):** Fostering inclusive community spaces and social cohesion among diverse population groups, advocating for the rights of marginalized populations, including indigenous peoples, refugees, and persons with disabilities, Participatory urban planning, and infrastructure development projects to enhance livability and sustainability.
- **Peace, Justice, and Strong Institutions (SDG 16):** Promoting community dialogue and conflict resolution mechanisms, strengthening community-based justice systems and legal aid services, building partnerships between communities, civil society organizations, and government agencies to promote accountability and transparency.





- **Disaster Management and Resilience:** Community engagement in disaster management involves building community resilience, preparedness, and response to natural disasters and emergencies. It includes training in disaster risk reduction, early warning systems, evacuation planning, and post-disaster recovery efforts.

## Credit Scheme, Duration, and Instructions

1. The student has to join/volunteer for a Registered NGO or Community Based private or public local administration such as gram panchayat, Anganwadi, Resident Welfare Association/ Corporate Social Responsibility department of any Company to complete 3 weeks of work as delegated by the authorities of these organizations.

Following are the indicative areas, however, the student may opt for any relevant work in sync with preamble and objective of this course:

- a) Alleviation of Poverty and Discrimination
  - b) Alleviation of hunger
  - c) Promoting of Good health and well-being
  - d) Promotion and Encouragement of Quality Education
  - e) Promoting Gender equality; Reducing inequalities
  - f) Provision of Clean Water and Sanitation
  - g) Providing accessible, reliable, and sustainable/green energy
  - h) Marine and Animal Protection
  - i) Action for Climate Change and Awareness
  - j) Action for Waste Management and Recycling
  - k) Promoting of Peace and Positive work environment in Organizations
  - l) Understanding Rural and Local economy and Livelihood
  - m) Interaction with Self-Help Group members
2. The duration of this course is 3 weeks. The course should be in Offline mode ONLY on the premises of the chosen organization or Field Work.
  3. Students are required to submit a project proposal in the IInd semester which will be reviewed and approved by the committee duly constituted by the concerned institution.
  4. The student will be required to submit a Certificate of Participation and Completion duly signed and stamped by the organization/institution on their letterhead.
  5. The report of the completed work should be submitted in Softcopy PDF Format to be duly digitally signed by the Guide/Faculty Supervisor. The report MUST consist of at least 3000 words, 12 fonts, Times New Roman with one and half line spaces as per the given format.
  6. Students must maintain a daily record of activities in a logbook/Diary.
  7. The report/presentation will also consist of Videos and photographs, as proof, of the work carried out.



## Evaluation Scheme

The evaluation scheme for community engagement initiatives is meticulously designed to guarantee a comprehensive assessment of the program's multifaceted dimensions. Through a systematic framework, it meticulously evaluates various aspects, ensuring a thorough understanding of the initiative's impact, effectiveness, and sustainability. This approach facilitates informed decision-making, fosters continuous improvement, and maximizes the positive impact of community engagement efforts on the students.

### Assessment and Marks: 100 Marks

**A. Submission of Report (60 Marks):** Submitted Report may be evaluated on the below broad points:

**3.1 General Introduction of the Event :** The Health Camp at Amity University Haryana was conducted as a part of Implementation of SEG project titled “Implementation of Community Based Participatory Research Using Interdisciplinary Approach to Provide Healthcare Solution for Women in Rural Haryana” funded by Ministry of Education under the Unnat Bharat Abhiyan 2.0.

**3.2 Inspiration & Objectives of the Event:** As per the project objective, health record of women residing in nearby villages will be studied and will be analysed to recommend corrective actions. The data is recorded using a mobile App developed by students of B Tech CSE, Mr. Hammad and Mr. Sujan Mali under the guidance of Prof. Satish Sardana, Dr Shweta Sinha, Dr Asim Kr. Mishra and Dr Subhra Das. The students of B Pharma- Mr. Bishal Gupta and Ms. Urja Sharma under the supervision of Prof. Sardana, Dr Dilip Kumar and Dr Asim Kumar collected the healthcare data (BP, Heart rate, SPO2, Height, weight, vision test, skin pigmentation checks) of 34 people comprising of students, women housekeeping staffs and male staffs. Dr Dilip counselled the women & staff members seeing the record for necessary dietary requirements. Prof. Sardana guided the students and faculty members during the health camp and counselled the women and staffs who came for the checkup.

The data will be further analysed using a software that the CS students will develop in collaboration with the AIP students.

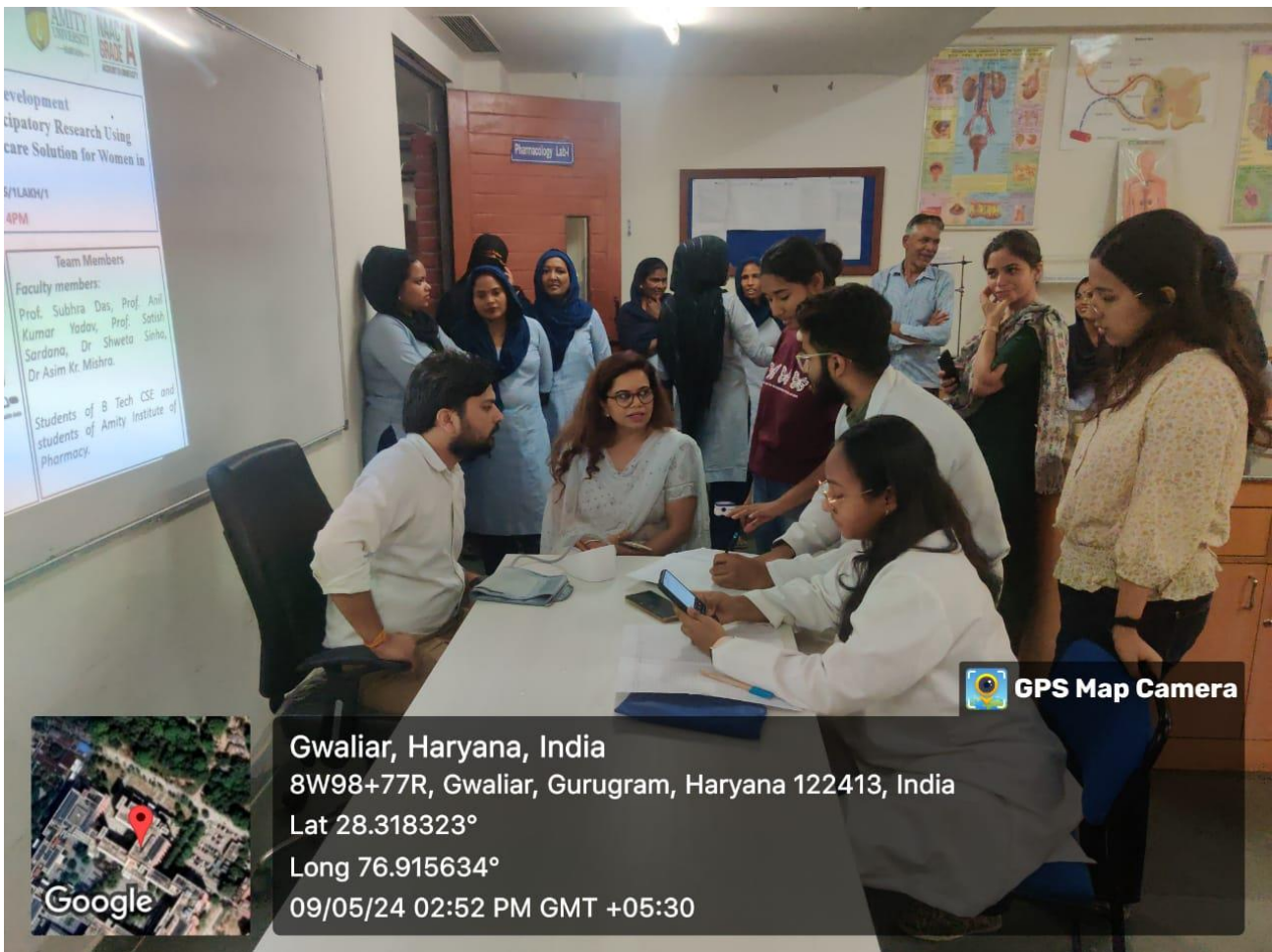

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

### 3. Event Report along with glimpses of the event (Photographs)

**3.1 General Introduction of the Event:** The One Day Training Program on “Fundamentals of Solar Photovoltaic and Power Plant Installations” was conducted to create awareness among the young adults from the nearby community for increasing the adoption of renewable energy by the society.

**3.2 Inspiration & Objectives of the Event:** The objective of the event is to provide a basic understating about solar photovoltaic cells and solar power plant installation. The event started with a welcome address by Dr Ranjana Arora, Associate Professor emphasizing the requirement of renewable energy to address the problems of climate change. Prof. (Dr) Paras Chawla, Director, ASET addressed the gathering and elaborated the skills that are needed for making a successful career in STEM. He talked about the next generation technologies like Artificial Intelligence, Machine Learning, IoT, Renewable Energy, Electric Vehicles and Smart Grids and how technology can be integrated to make systems smart. Prof. Subhra Das emphasised on the global opportunities that are there in the renewable energy sector. She talked about the commitment made by the countries for reducing greenhouse emissions under the Kyoto Protocol and the national commitment to keep the increase in temperature below 1.5°C to address the problems of Climate change. The inaugural session concluded with a vote of thanks.

**3.3 Brief about the address/talk of speakers-** The inaugural session was followed by technical sessions by Prof. Das. She talked about the history of solar cells and their usage in space applications. She discussed the photoelectric effect in detail and the materials which are used for fabrication of solar cells. She has explained the structure of solar cells, different types of cells and their working. Dr Arora discussed the different types of solar cells and how these are combined to make a panel. She discussed the basic requirement for installing a solar power plant and its components. The students had hands-on experience working in the solar lab. Faculty members demonstrated the different instruments used for conducting site surveys for solar power plant installation. They also performed experiments for measuring the current and voltage output from a solar panel in the outdoor location for different tilt angle of the panel. The participants were happy learning the basics of solar PV and showed their interest in talking about the technology within their peer groups. They found that solar systems are very useful for them to provide secure & reliable electricity at their homes.

At the end, participants were provided certificate of participation for the solar training. The participants showed their interest in taking admission in engineering and sciences. Further counselling was provided by the admission team to make the candidates aware about the various opportunities that are there at Amity University Haryana.
