The entrepreneurs in this field are associated with non-profit sectors and organizations. But this does not eliminate the need of making a profit. After all, entrepreneurs need capital to carry on with the process and bring a positive change in society. Social entrepreneurs set up enterprises to solve a social issue and the resulting enterprises prioritise social objectives over financial goals.

Social innovation refers to the design and implementation of new solutions that imply conceptually, process, product, or organisational change, which ultimately aim to improve the

welfare and wellbeing of individuals and communities. Many initiatives undertaken by the social economy and by the civil society have proven to be innovative in dealing with socio-economic and environmental problems while contributing to economic development. To fully tap the potential of social innovation, an enabling policy framework is needed to support public, non-profit and private actors to co-construct and implement socially innovative solutions and thereby contribute to addressing socio-economic issues, build stronger territorial resilience and better respond to future shocks.

Change leadership is the ability to influence and inspire action in others, responding with vision and agility during periods of growth, disruption, or uncertainty to bring about the needed change. We all know that change is constant, and we are all affected by the changing weather, natural disasters, and the march of time. Changes caused by human activity - inventions, migrations, wars, government policies, new markets, and new values - affect organizations as well as individuals. Threats and opportunities call for change, but how organizations change depends on leadership, the knowledge and philosophy of leaders, and their ability to engage followers. It is the use of general ethical ideas to any profession.” Professional ethics refers to the moral principles and standards and a code of conduct that a person is expected to follow while performing his /er jobs and in dealing with others. A profession as a means of any society is to focus on the use of scarce resources to produce, in an utmost efficient manner those goods and services that are demanded by the society and there is a high chance to get good return in many forms. The vital issues in any professional ethics include ethical management of enterprise/organisation/business in relation to its stakeholders and natural environment.

To ensure that the Professional ethics exists for the saneness or purity of determination that is sustained through judiciously designed actual practices of any organisation/ company /firm that is relating to its business and the employees, suppliers, customers and neighbours, its fiduciary responsibility to its shareholders. It is an embodiment of conscious concern towards the execution of any professional processes in tune with the nobility of the purpose. While referring to Professional Ethics, our ‘Father of the Nation’ Mahatma Gandhi had stated that all profession has a social responsibility that is not related to ordinary economic activity and profits.

For example, if any area adjoining an organisation/business/firm is hit by a natural calamity, the community in the locality would expect the business to contribute to the relief work by cash or kind. The act of kindness and philanthropy to take part in social responsibility arises out of ethical considerations and not out of profit-making considerations. Therefore, the responsibility towards society is a moral obligation arising out of business ethics, which in turn is steeped in the philosophy of business for Sustainable Entrepreneurship, Innovation and Leadership.

Online education and learning mechanisms face many challenges, but the Rise and Extension of Policy and Knowledge Entrepreneurs in India and globally have brought a paradigm shift championing knowledge leadership beyond borders and connecting learners, trainers and entrepreneurs.

Panel Discussion Session Topic: Defence Corridor and Entrepreneurship

Day & Date: Saturday, 22 January 2022

Overview:

The Government of India has responded to the long-standing need to give a coordinated thrust to the development and growth of defense industry in India. Knowing that India is among the top five military spenders in the world, the Government of India wants to develop the country into a defense manufacturing hub leading to self-reliance in terms of defense equipment and technology. Therefore, to support the growth of the defense sector and enhance the manufacturing capacity of the sector, the Government of India has launched two Defence

Industrial Corridors (DICs) – one in Uttar Pradesh and the second in Tamil Nadu. The initiative aims to promote Make in India while catalysing indigenous production of defense and aerospace related items. The intention is to induce Private Sector partnerships with Public Sector Undertakings. The objective of the scheme is to promote indigenous defense production, with a special focus on the participation of Micro, Small and Medium Scale Enterprises (MSMEs) and Startups by bridging gaps in defense manufacturing and testing infrastructure of the country.

The Corridor in Uttar Pradesh shall be connecting six cities, namely Agra, Aligarh, Chitrakoot, Jhansi, Kanpur, and Lucknow, while the Tamil Nadu Corridor will connect Chennai, Tiruchirappalli, Coimbatore, Salem, and Hosur. New defense production facilities and clusters with necessary testing and certification facilities, export facilitation centers, technology transfer facilitation, shall be established in these corridors. The capital-intensive initiative aims at setting up greenfield defense manufacturing and testing infrastructure, it will have tremendous scope of entrepreneurial opportunities at all levels. Tapping and Realising this potential requires timely attention and exploration of the possibilities of entrepreneurial opportunities and their various dimensions. Therefore, this session aims at exploring the same with the following objectives and questions to be explored:

Session Objectives:

- To explore the possibilities of entrepreneurship around the two designated defense industrial corridors (DICs) in India.
- To identify the role and scope for MSMEs-related entrepreneurial opportunities for them in the designated defense industrial corridors (DICs).

Key Questions to be Explored:

- What are the government plans to incentivise entrepreneurship in the designated defense industrial corridors (DICs) in Uttar Pradesh and Tamil Nadu?
- How much and what kind of employment the defense industrial corridors (DICs) are going to generate?

- Explore what kind of entrepreneurial opportunities could be generated within the corridors?
- Analyse how are these defense industrial corridors (DICs) going to contribute to the larger industrial and entrepreneurship environment in India?
- Discuss what is the scope of the Public-Private Partnerships (PPP), and how can this be translated into entrepreneurial opportunities?
- Discuss if there is any scope for the service sector?

Panel Discussion Session Topic: The Future of Industry and Jobs in the International Landscape:

Leveraging the Skills of Humanities and Social Sciences

Overview:

The emerging international landscape of industry and jobs for Humanities & Social Sciences, and more specifically International Relations require an understanding of the rapidly shifting political, socio-economic, cultural, security and strategic environment. While nation-states have largely driven international affairs, the rise of non-state actors has had wide-ranging and deepening implications for the international system. The rise of multinational actors has dramatically changed the global financial order and the international business environment plus the advent of violent non-state actors in the form of transnational terrorist groups have changed the global security landscape. The complex dynamics of inter-state competition and cooperation require a dynamic training of those acquiring knowledge and information on International Relations. Issue areas such as Climate Change, Global Health Security, Cyberspace, Artificial Intelligence, Machine Learning and Outer Space are redefining research priorities and the multifaceted nature of requisite skills. In such a dynamic environment, the Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) will be occupying a critical role in terms of promoting a culture of knowledge and learning. The HEIs will need to rethink and revisualize its traditional curriculum designs and engage in innovative pedagogic practices to inculcate not only the required domain knowledge, but also imbibe a practice of dexterity to adapt, learn, unlearn and relearn the emerging aspects of Humanities & Social Sciences, and in particular the specific domain of International Relations.

Session Objectives:

The objectives of the session are as follows:

- To examine the changing international landscape of industry and jobs and correlate it to the outcomes of learning in Humanities & Social Sciences, with a special focus on International Relations.

Overview:

The entrepreneurial spirit is widely acknowledged and appreciated. It catalyses change and pushes the boundaries of the perceived status quo. Socio-economic change is driven by novelty in ideas and an undying spirit for innovation. Public policy also pioneers change and progress in society quite akin to entrepreneurial spirit and it is increasingly becoming difficult to delineate the two. The amalgamation of entrepreneurial tendencies and public policy formulation would result in greater progress and innovation in society. It is imperative to explore the amalgamation of innovation and policy.

Session Objectives:

The objectives of the sessions are as follows:

- To examine the role of policymakers in promoting innovation and entrepreneurship.
